

ANDREW GELFUSO

Andrew F. Gelfuso is Vice President at Trade Center Management Associates (TCMA), which serves as the full-service, property management company for the Ronald Reagan Building and International Trade Center. It is also designated as the official World Trade Center of Washington, DC which is part of the global network of the Centers with affiliates in over 90 countries around the world.

As Vice President, Gelfuso directs the World Trade Center, Washington, DC. In this capacity Mr. Gelfuso leads the global mission of the Center while focusing on international business development, program promotion, business matchmaking, outreach, trade counseling, strategic partnerships, government and diplomatic relations.

Previously, Gelfuso was the Regional Manager for Asia at the U.S. Government's Advocacy Center with the U.S. Department of Commerce. KENNETH I. LEVINSON

Ken Levinson serves as the Executive Director of the Washington International Trade Association (WITA). With over 3,000 members, WITA is Washington's largest non-profit, non-partisan organization dedicated to providing a neutral forum in the U.S. capital for the open and robust discussion of international trade policy and economic issues.

Previously, Ken served as Senior Director for Global Government Affairs for AstraZeneca and as Senior Vice President and COO at the Washington, DC consulting firm of Fontheim International. Ken joined Fontheim after spending six years on the staff of U.S. Senator John D. (Jay) Rockefeller IV, where he served as the Senator's chief advisor on the U.S. Senate Finance Committee dealing with international trade and tax policy.

Ken received his Master's Degree from New York University after doing his undergraduate work at the University of Massachusetts, in Amherst. Ken also spent a year studying at the University of Copenhagen, Denmark. Ken and his wife, the Reverend Donna Marsh, live in Bethesda, MD, with their two daughters.



LAURA LANE

Laura Lane serves as President of Global Public Affairs for UPS. Prior to joining UPS, Laura was Managing Director and Head of International Government Affairs at Citigroup and VP for Global Public Policy with Time Warner. In her government career, Ms. Lane served in the US Trade Representative's office and was involved in the negotiations on China's entry to the World Trade Organization (WTO), the WTO Financial Services agreement and the WTO Basic Telecommunications Agreement. Ms. Lane was a diplomat in the U.S. Foreign Service from 1990-1997, serving at the American Embassy in Kigali, Rwanda from 1993-1994. She led the evacuation effort of American citizens in April 1994 with the outbreak of civil war and returned as political advisor to U.S. forces providing humanitarian relief to Rwandan refugees in the aftermath of the genocide. She shared her perspectives on the Rwandan genocide in her TED Talk "When to Follow your Heart and Write your own Rules" and in the PBS/Frontline documentary "Ghosts of Rwanda," Ms. Lane also served as consular officer. in Bogota, Colombia from 1990-1992.

Ms. Lane holds a BA from Loyola University and a Master's Degree in Foreign Service with a Certificate in International Business Diplomacy from Georgetown University. She and her husband have two daughters.

ARMCHAIR DISCUSSION WITH KEVIN BRADY



AMBASSADOR SUSAN SCHWAB

Susan C. Schwab is a Strategic Advisor in Mayer Brown's International Trade practice and offers cross practice and cross office counsel to Mayer Brown's clients on a wide range of issues and policies.

Ambassador Schwab's advisory role for Mayer Brown is in addition to her professorship at the School of Public Policy at the University of Maryland, where previously she had served as Dean, and as President of the University System of Maryland Foundation. From 2005-2009 she served as US Trade Representative and Deputy USTR in the George W. Bush administration. She also sits on several corporate boards, and is a frequent speaker at associations, corporations, and think tanks.

During her tenure as the USTR, Ambassador Schwab successfully concluded the US's Free Trade Agreements (FTAs) with Peru, Colombia, Panama and South Korea and launched the Trans-Pacific Partnership (TPP) talks. Ambassador Schwab also helped to achieve congressional approval of Permanent Normal Trade Relations (PNTR) with Vietnam, FTAs with Oman and Peru, and the bipartisan "May 10th, 2007 deal" on trade, labor and the environment. She also oversaw implementation of FTAs with 6 Central American Free Trade Agreement (CAFTA) countries, Bahrain, Oman and Peru.

Amhassador Schwah has more than three decades of international trade and policy experience. She began her career in the USTR's office as a trade negotiator for agriculture issues. After two years, she headed to Tokyo where she served as a Trade Policy Officer at the American Embassy. She later spent 8 years working for Sen. John Danforth (R-Mo), first as Chief Economist and Legislative Assistant for International Trade and then as Legislative Director. In 1989 she became the Director General of the US & Foreign Commercial Service at the US Department of Commerce, where she oversaw 200 international and domestic field offices with 1300 employees and a budget totaling \$115 million. Following that, she worked as a senior executive at a major US company negotiating deals to access the Chinese market.



REPRESENTATIVE KEVIN BRADY U.S. Congressman Kevin Brady serves as

Ranking Member of the House Ways and Means

Committee, whose jurisdiction includes taxes, international trade, health care, Medicare, Social Security, and welfare.

Previously, as Chairman, Brady led the historic effort in 2017 to deliver the first comprehensive overhaul of America's tax system in more than 30 years. Brady previously chaired the Ways and Means Health Subcommittee and served as Chairman and Vice Chairman of the bicameral loint Economic Committee.

Until 2013, he chaired the Ways and Means Trade Subcommittee where he played a key role in passing new sales agreements with Panama, South Korea, and Colombia, as well as the Dominican Republic-Central American Free Trade Agreement.

Prior to his election to Congress, Brady worked as a chamber of commerce executive for 18 years and served six years in the Texas House of Representatives. He is a Distinguished Alumni of the University of South Dakota, and lives in Montgomery County, Texas, with his wife and two sons.

ERIC FARNSWORTH

Eric Farnsworth joined the Americas Society and Council of the Americas as Washington office head in 2003 after close to 15 years in government and the private sector. Since that time, he has effectively enhanced and expanded the reach of the combined organizations in Washington through deeply informed policy development and promotion, active thought-leadership and public affairs, and diligent member and constituent service.

A widely sought-after speaker and commentator, he has been invited numerous times to testify before the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives as well as various agencies of the U.S. government, and he publishes regularly in leading journals and newspapers.

Mr. Farnsworth began his career with the U.S. Department of State after earning an MPA in International Relations from Princeton. During his time in government he served in positions of increasing responsibility in the foreign and trade policy communities within the State Department and also the Office of the U.S. Trade

Representative, culminating in appointment as the senior advisor to the White House Special Envoy for the Americas from 1995-98.

Between the White House and AS/COA, Mr.
Farnsworth worked as a senior government relations professional with Manatt Phelps & Phillips LLP, helping to launch ManattJones Global Strategies where he served as founding Managing Director. He was decorated in 2016 by the Government of Spain for his work to champion hemispheric democracy.



PERRIN BEATTY

The Honourable Perrin Beatty, P.C., O.C., is the President and Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of the 200,000-member Canadian Chamber of Commerce, Canada's largest and most representative national business association. He has been President and CEO of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce since August 2007.

A descendant of one of Canada's most prominent manufacturing families, Perrin grew up in Fergus, Ontario and graduated from the University of Western Ontario. In 1972, he was elected to the House of Commons as a Progressive Conservative, where he held seven different ministerial portfolios. After his time in government, Perrin

became President and CEO of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation (CBC) and later of Canadian Manufacturers and Exporters (CME).

Dedicated to education, Perrin is a former Chancellor of the University of Ontario Institute of Technology. In 2018, Perrin was appointed to the Order of Canada as an Officer.



KENNETH SMITH RAMOS

Kenneth Smith Ramos is a Partner at AGON, a Mexican Consulting firm that specializes in competition, regulatory affairs, and international trade. Ken focuses on helping international clients to identify trade and investment opportunities derived from the new generation of FTAs that Mexico has negotiated, such as CPTPP, the MX-EU FTA, and the NAFTA/USMCA. Ken also advises clients who face trade barriers and assists them in developing strategies to obtain or expand access into key international markets, including Mexico.

Prior to joining AGON, Ken served as Mexico´s Chief Negotiator for the modernization of the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) that led to the signing of the USMCA. Mr. Smith Ramos brings a wealth of experience with his long running career in the Mexican Government and expertise in international trade negotiations. Mr. Smith Ramos began his professional career working for Mexico's NAFTA negotiating team, and has since been an integral part of Mexico's negotiating team representing several government agencies.

As the Representative of Mexico's Ministry of Economy in the Embassy of Mexico (2013-2017), he led efforts to promote Mexico's trade interests in the United States and served as the Ministry's liaison with US private and public sector stakeholders, NGOs and think tanks.

Mr. Smith Ramos' broad negotiation experience is the product of nearly three decades of public service. Mr. Smith Ramos was Coordinator General for International Affairs in the Ministry of Agriculture (SAGARPA), where he was responsible for agricultural trade negotiations and international cooperation. He also served as Director General for International Affairs in the Federal Competition Commission, and was Director General for North America in the Ministry of Economy.

Mr. Smith Ramos holds a Bachelor's degree in International Affairs from Georgetown University, and a Master's degree in International Economics from Johns Hopkins, School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS).



AMBASSADOR MIRIAM SAPIRO

Ambassador Miriam Sapiro is a Managing Director at Sard Verbinnen & Co. (SVC) and Vice Chairman of SVC Public Affairs. She co-heads SVC's Washington D.C. office.

Miriam served in the administrations of Presidents Reagan, Bush, Clinton and Obama, working at the State Department, the National Security Council and USTR. Upon confirmation by the Senate as Ambassador, she was Deputy U.S. Trade Representative and Acting U.S. Trade Representative. She served also as a senior member of the Committee on Foreign Investment in the United States (CFIUS) and on the Board of the Overseas Private Investment Corporation (OPIC). Miriam's previous government experience includes working in the White House as Special Assistant and Counselor to the President and as a Director of European Affairs at the National Security Council. She also served as a member of the Secretary of State's Policy Planning Staff and worked in the Office of the Legal Adviser, where she helped negotiate the Dayton Peace Accords that ended the war in Bosnia. She is the recipient of two Superior Honor Awards from the Department of State.

Prior to joining SVC, Miriam was a partner at Finsbury and led its Washington D.C. office.

Previously, she founded Summit Strategies International, a firm providing counsel to clients on technology policy, international trade, investment and political risk. She was a Non-Resident Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution. Miriam serves on the Supervisory Board of the Lufthansa Group, the Board of Directors of Project HOPE, the Panel of Conciliators of the International Centre for Settlement of Investment Disputes at the World Bank, and the Department of State's Advisory Committee on Cyber and International Communications and Information Policy.

Miriam earned a B.A. from Williams College and a J.D. from NYU School of Law. She was a Rotary Fellow at St. Antony's College, Oxford University.

IN A TRADE WAR WITH CHINA, WHAT DOES VICTORY LOOK LIKE?



AMBASSADOR DARCI VETTER

Ambassador Darci Vetter is Vice Chair, Agriculture, Food and Trade at Edelman. She is the former Chief Agricultural Negotiator at the US Trade Representative (USTR) and Under Secretary at the US Department of Agriculture (USDA). Darci leads Edelman's Washington, DC Public Affairs practice.

Darci brings deep international trade, agriculture and food experience following a 17-year career in the federal government, and is spearheading the growth of Edelman's global Agriculture, Food and Trade business. In her role, Darci works closely with Edelman's clients to help develop strategies that best navigate the changing policy landscape. Areas of expertise include helping translate US, foreign government or WTO processes to business; reviewing and adjusting supply chains to respond to government mandates and consumer demands; supporting the development of formal commentary on regulatory matters; and adapting corporate messaging and branding to reflect broad policy changes.



DAVID DOLLAR

David Dollar is a senior fellow at the Brookings Institution's John L. Thornton China Center. He is a leading expert on China's economy and U.S.-China economic relations.

From 2009 to 2013 he was the U.S. Treasury's economic and financial emissary to China. Prior to that, Dollar worked at the World Bank, and from 2004 to 2009 was country director for China and Mongolia. His other World Bank assignments primarily focused on Asian economies, including South Korea, Vietnam, Cambodia, Thailand, Bangladesh and India. From 1995 to 2004, Dollar worked in the World Bank's research department, publishing articles on globalization, growth, and inequality.

Prior to his World Bank career, Dollar was an assistant professor of economics at UCLA, spending a semester in Beijing teaching at the Graduate School of the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences.

He has a PhD in economics from NYU and a BA in Asian Studies from Dartmouth College.



BONNIE GLASER

Bonnie S. Glaser is a senior adviser for Asia and the director of the China Power Project at CSIS, where she works on issues related to Chinese foreign and security policy. She is concomitantly a nonresident fellow with the Lowy Institute in Sydney, Australia, and a senior associate with the Pacific Forum.

From 2008 to 2015, Ms. Glaser was a senior adviser with the Freeman Chair in China Studies, and from 2003 to mid-2008, she was a senior associate in the CSIS International Security Program. Prior to joining CSIS, she served as a consultant for various U.S. government offices, including the Departments of Defense and State.

Ms. Glaser has written extensively on Chinese foreign and security policy and is a regular contributor to the Pacific Forum's quarterly web journal Comparative Connections. She is currently a board member of the U.S. Committee of the Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia Pacific, and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and the International Institute for Strategic Studies.



DAVID GOLDMAN

David P. Goldman is an American economist, music critic, and author, best known for his series of online essays in the Asia Times under the pseudonym Spengler. Goldman is a principal of Asia Times Holdings and a columnist for Asia Times. Goldman sits on the board of Asia Times Holdings.

Previously he was a Managing Director at Yunfeng Financial (Hong Kong), and before that headed debt research at Bank of America and Cantor Fitzgerald. He is a Senior Fellow at the London Center for Policy Research. He advises institutional investors on macro opportunities and political risk.




DOROTHY DWOSKIN

Dorothy Dwoskin is the Principal at d2 Strategies LLC, a consulting firm focused on international trade and economic policy, working with clients on a variety of issues. Her work builds on her expertise as a trade negotiator and a tech policy official. In addition to the WITA Board, she remains active with the Washington Council on International Trade, based in Seattle.


From 2007-2017 Dorothy was Senior Director of Global Trade Policy and Strategy at Microsoft, and a member of its Federal Government team in Washington D.C., leading the company's policy efforts to promote open markets and fair trade in software and services, collaborating with government agencies, Congress, international organizations, and foreign governments. She worked extensively on Microsoft's agenda with China and other Microsoft subsidiaries pursuing the company's global interests in the trade area, including the intersection of trade policy and cloud policy.

From 1978-2007, Dorothy was a member of the career staff at the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative (USTR), serving in many positions, including USTR's Geneva Office. Before her departure, she was a member of the Senior
Executive Service. Dorothy served as the Assistant
USTR for the World Trade Organization (WTO) and
Multilateral Affairs at USTR. In that position she
was responsible for trade negotiations and policy
matters before the WTO, in the Doha Round and the
Uruguay Round. She served as lead U.S. negotiator
on a variety of trade policy issues, including the
Information Technology Agreement (ITA), and
led the negotiating teams setting the terms of
membership for countries acceding to the WTO.
She led teams resulting in successful bilateral WTO
market access agreements with Russia and the
Ukraine, and concluded membership negotiations
for the accession of Vietnam and Saudi Arabia.



GINA CHON

Gina is the Washington columnist for Reuters Breakingviews, where she writes opinion pieces on the economy, trade, regulation and enforcement. She joined Breakingviews in 2016 from the Financial Times, where she covered white-collar crime and cyber security. She spent seven years at the Wall Street Journal in New York, Baghdad and Detroit, covering M&A, the Iraq war and cars. She also has written a book about the Khmer Rouge, trained journalists in Iraq and has reported from South Korea, Vietnam and Myanmar.



SHAWN DONNAN

Shawn Donnan is a senior writer for Bloomberg News where he covers world trade and globalization across the organization's many platforms from TV to Businessweek, the magazine. He joined Bloomberg in 2018 from the Financial Times where he served most recently as World Trade Editor. Prior to that Donnan was the FT's World News Editor, coordinating the paper's global coverage of economics and politics. He also worked as a correspondent and editor for the FT in Indonesia and Hong Kong, from where he edited the paper's China coverage. He is a graduate of Boston University.



DAVID LYNCH

David J. Lynch is The Washington Post's global economics correspondent. He was previously a Washington correspondent for The Financial Times, where he covered white-collar crime. Formerly a senior writer with Bloomberg News focusing on the intersection of politics and economics, he also followed the global economy for USA TODAY, where he was the founding bureau chief in both London and Beijing. He covered the wars in Kosovo and Iraq, the latter as an embedded reporter with the U.S. Marines, and was the paper's first recipient of a Nieman fellowship at Harvard University. He has reported from more than 60 countries.

During more than three decades as a journalist, Lynch also worked as a financial writer specializing in the aerospace and defense industries for The Orange County Register in southern California. In the 1980s, he was the editor of Defense Week, a Washington, D.C., trade publication covering national security.

Lynch has a master's degree in international relations from Yale University and a B.A. in government from Wesleyan University in Middletown, Ct. He lives in northern Virginia with his wife Kathleen and their three sons.

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GLOBAL VALUE CHAINS



STEPHEN LAMAR

Stephen Lamar is Executive Vice President at the American Apparel & Footwear Association (AAFA). Steve is responsible for the design and execution of AAFA lobbying strategies on a series of issues covering trade, supply chains, and brand protection. GRANT ALDONAS

Grant Aldonas joined the IIEL in the fall of 2017 as Executive Director, bringing to the Institute an extensive leadership background in both government and the private sector.

Mr. Aldonas was confirmed as the Under Secretary of Commerce for International Trade in 2001 and served in that capacity until 2005. There, he led a federal agency of 2,400 employees and 80 offices worldwide. In his capacity as Under Secretary of Commerce, Aldonas advised the President and Secretary of Commerce on a range of international economic issues, chaired the White House working group responsible for the administration's successful pursuit of renewed trade negotiating authority, and served as the lead negotiator for the United States on issues involving trade remedies, international investment disciplines, competition policy and government procurement in multilateral and bilateral trade negotiations. As Under Secretary, Grant also served as the Executive Secretary of the Cabinet-level President's Export Council: Executive Director of the Trade Promotion Coordinating Committee, which oversaw the export promotion programs of 22 federal agencies: and as a member of the Board of Directors of the Overseas Private Investment Corporation.

Grant is also the founder and principal managing director of Split Rock International, a consultancy that advises global companies, governments, and international institutions on globalization, trade, and economic development. He has taught at Georgetown Law as an adjunct professor since 2000, served as an IIEL Advisory Board Member and Senior Fellow, and co-chaired the Institute's flagship annual academy on international economic law. Grant also serves as a Senior Adviser with the Center for Strategic and International Studies and as a Commissioner with the London-based Legatum Institute's Special

Trade Commission, which was formed to develop options for the British government's post-Brexit trade policy. Grant is a member of the Board of Directors of the Information Technology and Innovation Foundation and National Sawdust, a music venue in Brooklyn, New York, dedicated to providing a space for emerging artists to perform. Grant is, in addition, a guitarist and music producer whose work includes producing a well-received series of concerts exploring American blues and roots quitar.

Grant has served as Majority Chief International Trade Counsel with the U.S. Senate Committee on Finance. In that capacity, he played an instrumental role in the passage of the Trade and Development Act of 2000, which extended trade preferences to Sub-Saharan Africa, the Caribbean and Central America, and legislation normalizing U.S. trade relations with China. He also led a two-year oversight investigation of the U.S. Customs Service, resulting in enactment of the Customs Authorization Act of 1999. Additionally, Grant has served as Chairman of Transparency International – US, the American arm of the world's leading non-governmental organization focused on eliminating corruption globally, and as a member of the Board of Directors of the Center for International Private Enterprise, one of the four pillars of the National Endowment for Democracy. Grant has also been a U.S. diplomat and a partner at global law firms. Grant also served as counsel to the Commission on U.S.-Asia-Pacific Trade and Investment Policy and the Bipartisan Commission on Entitlement and Tax Reform. He served as a consultant and adviser on law reform to a

number of Eastern European and former Soviet Republics under the American Bar Association's (ABA) Central and East European Law Initiative. He chaired the ABA's Task Force on Multilateral Investment Agreements, as well as served as Vice Chair of the International Section's Trade and Investment Committees.

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
